ABOUT US

The Asia Democracy Network (ADN) is a civil society led multi-stakeholder platform dedicated to bringing all aspects of society in Asia together to promote and defend democracy and human rights as a collective. ADN is a network of networks consisting of members that are regional networks that work on diverse themes under the umbrella of democracy. We have 11 network members and over 300 national members. As a network, we aim to promote democratic unity, solidarity, and cultivate the generation of advocates to sustain the democracy movement.

ADN was established when a diverse group of civil society democracy advocates came together in 2012 calling for the need for a democracy advocacy network that intersects sectors and themes under the large umbrella of democracy to strengthen solidarity and unity in Asia. The call became a reality in 2013, when the ADN officially launched in Seoul, Korea.

ADN headquarters is based in Seoul, Korea with ADN staff members located in Thailand, the Philippines, Indonesia, India, and Malaysia.

THE PANDEMIC AND INNOVATION

Adapting to pandemic restrictions, ADN was able to sustain and create a new online platform to fulfill its function in providing democracy education, consolidate the democratic narrative, and support activists. In 2019-2021 ADN has successfully established the following initiatives:

a. Asia Democracy Chronicles (ADC): Highlighting Asia’s Democracy Narrative

The Asia Democracy Chronicles is an online news platform that highlights the democracy and human rights challenges in the Asia Region. Through the contributions of renown journalists and democracy advocates, we can directly hear from the ground the democracy situation. Through this process, we aim to establish Asia’s democracy narrative and strengthen regional solidarity.

Over the course of 2021, the ADC has endeavored to cover a wider gamut of issues dealing with human rights and issues around democracy, highlighting more countries in Asia, with more writers on board, on top of the others that have been featured with more consistency since the inception of ADC:

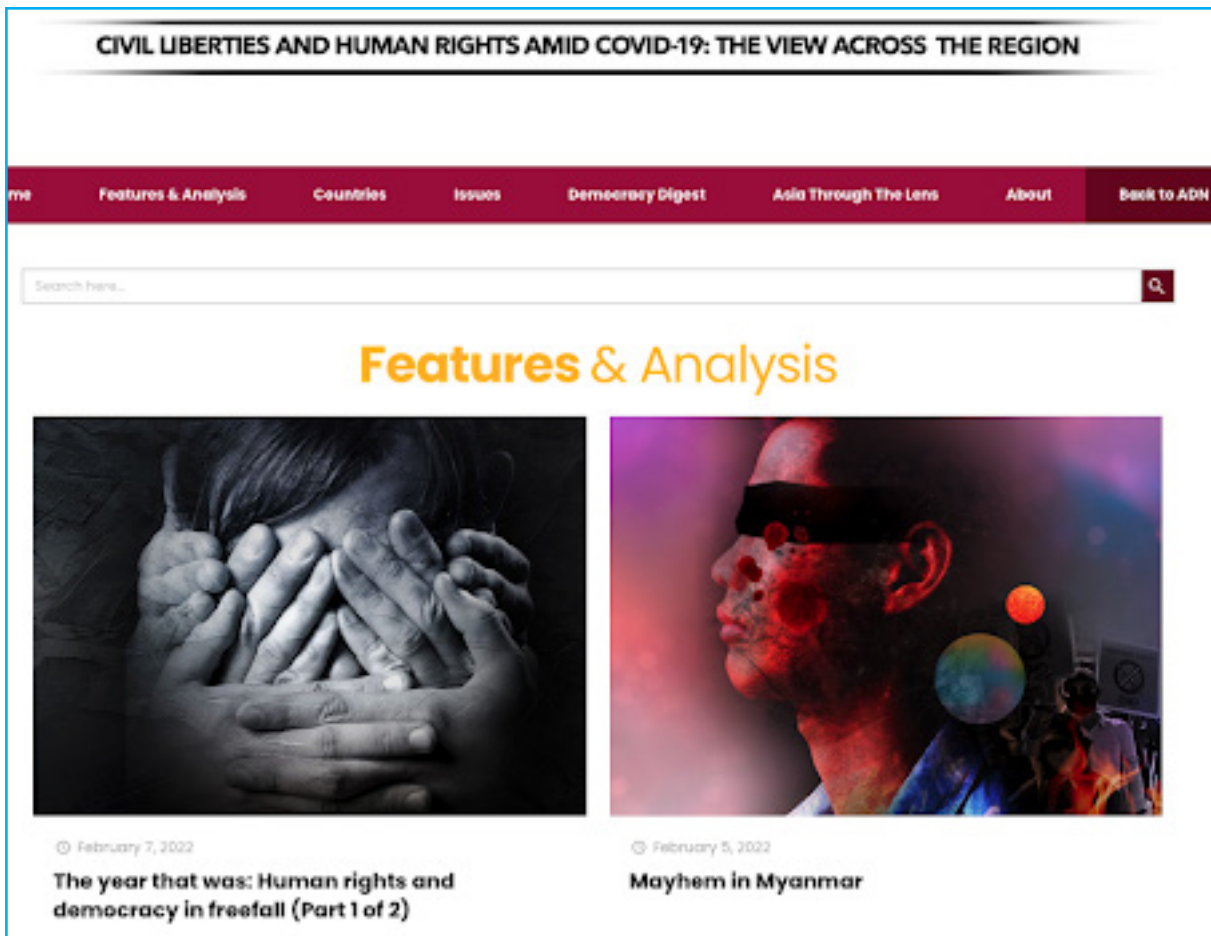
Issues Highlighted

The plethora of stories we've covered put a spotlight on structural issues undermining many of the challenges confronting countries in the region in the midst of the pandemic. These focused on specific sectors of society such as women, children, labor, and the LGBTQ community. We also highlighted sensitive topics that otherwise remain under the radar such as the marginalization of the transgender labor sector in Sri Lanka, the unfair labor practices that have put gig workers in Indonesia in a bind, the indigenous hunters in Taiwan, to name a few.

Other articles sought to provide a regional, not just country-specific, perspective on specific issues, an example of which is the Southeast Asian' leaders pandemic response and it has adversely impacted politics in the region.

With more writers on board, ADC has been able to cover more ground and a few more countries.

Other components of ADC sought to raise further awareness of specific issues. The Democracy Digest and Asia Through the Lens helped fulfill this purpose, as they highlighted other important issues in creative formats.



b. Skills Building Programs: Online Democracy Academy, Digital Advocacy Training, and Digital Security Trainings

In ensuring the continuity of providing training to enhance skills for NGOs actors ADN has implemented platforms for actors to expand their knowledge of democracy and digital security, respectively.

The Democracy Academy Platform was created through a collaboration of multi-sectoral experts to develop a structured curriculum that expands knowledge on democracy that is easily accessible for everybody. The interactive online platform was launched on November 26, 2020 and allows the learner to go through the curriculum at their own pace. In addition to the online platform the textbook is also available for download in PDF form. In May 2021, we piloted the online program in Timor-Leste, Indonesia, and India. In Timor Leste, tests were held in two clusters, one for Women NGOs attended by 20 leaders and for the Commission National of Elections (CNE) attended by 20 CNE's commissioners and official representatives from 13 existing districts in the country. In Indonesia, the training was held in a different approach and blended with the state democracy volunteer program organized by the Electoral Supervisory Body (Bawaslu) attended by 204 persons consisting of mixed youth representatives selected from 34 existing Indonesia provinces. In India, the pilot is currently in progress with the curriculum being translated into a local language and an online training is scheduled for 2022.

ADN manual is available in English, Bahasa Indonesia, and Hindi languages and will be available on ADN's website in PDF form.

Digital Security Training Platform was developed in cooperation with the Southeast Asia Freedom Expression Network ([SAFE-net](#)) to increase knowledge and skills to members of civil society who work in high risk environments. The online platform provided self-learning and downloadable manuals for users in addition to comprehensive training that were facilitated to respond to urgent cases happening in the region.

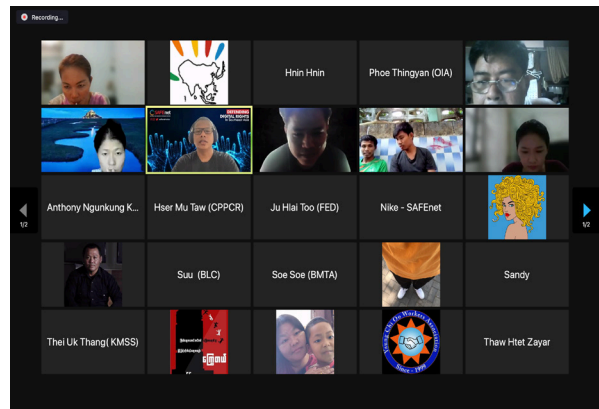
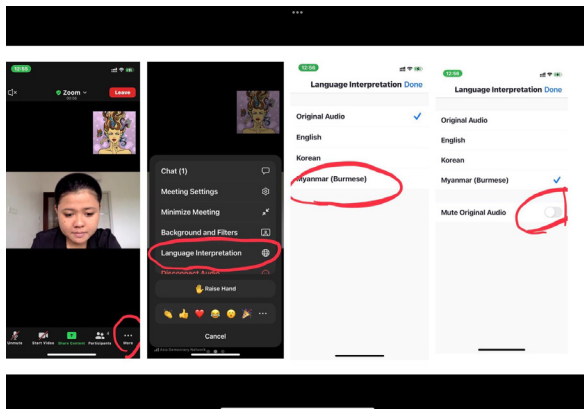
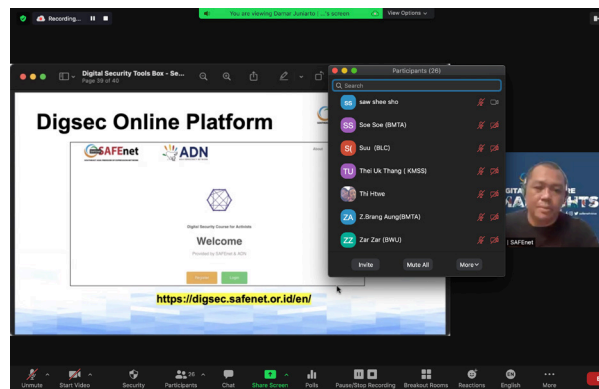
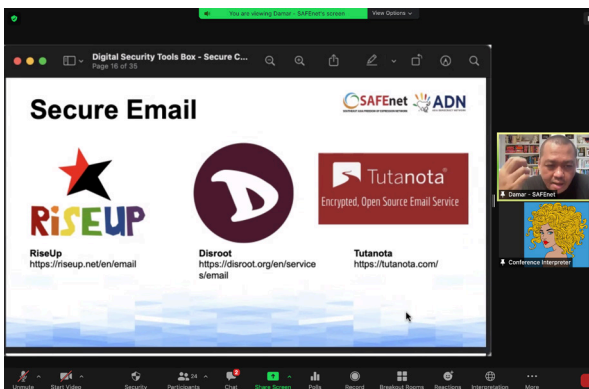
Following are descriptions of specific programs implemented:

Digital Security Training for Myanmar activists and opposition officials was successfully organized as a response to the rapidly changing environment. In the Philippines, we also held a training program for 20 NGO activists to equip them with tools to maneuver secure communication throughout their work.

Digital Security Training for Southeast Asian Groups In collaboration with the National Democratic Institute (NDI) and Safenet, ADN conducted a series of training aimed at expanding the knowledge of civil society actors on enabling and securing social media platforms. The training was conducted by experts from Safenet who discussed the threats existing within the digital space, theoretical foundations of digital security, and tools on how

to ensure digital hygiene, which includes password managers, VPNs, secure communication mediums, and secure alternative programs organizations can use. The expert from NDI, on the other hand, discussed how organizations can adopt digital securities and considerations when creating these policies. The training also adopted games to test the progress of participants and their understanding of their learnings during the training. The training was attended by 15 representatives from various Southeast Asian countries.

Digital Advocacy Training for Southeast Asian Groups. A Digital Advocacy Training was also conducted through the partnership of the Asia Democracy Network and the Active Vista, a civil society organization in the Philippines. For the training, 25 participants were selected, from 5 countries in Southeast Asia (Cambodia: 6, Indonesia: 5, Malaysia: 1, Philippines: 9, Thailand: 4). Of the 25 participants, 15 are women. The training highlighted that social media advocacy and real world advocacy are interconnected. The discussions first identified the major challenges experienced by CSOs and the Digital Landscape as they conduct advocacy campaigns online. This is to guide the participants in defining the Change Framework and the concept of the blended world. Discussions centered around understanding the core aspects of what makes an impactful digital advocacy campaign. Finally, the participants were also taught the value of blended tactics and how they can apply it in their respective local and organizational advocacy contexts.



DEMOCRATIC CONSOLIDATION: ROAD TO RENEWING DEMOCRACY

After its delay due to the pandemic, ADN went forward in 2021 to implement the **Asia Democracy Consolidation** process. After preparation, it was implemented systematically through a refined method. The consolidation is structured to build and promote a roadmap in confronting democratic regression. To do this, ADN introduced an approach that aims to deepen discussion, increase participation, and strengthen NGO engagement at the regional and national levels. First the consultations were (i) the national consolidation, (ii) sub-regional consultation, (iii) democratic assessment through SDGs lens, (iv) organize democratic assembly, and (v) produce a document to renew democracy in Asia.

At the forefront of responding to democracy regression are national actors. Therefore in 2021, ADN initiated the **national democracy consolidation program** in five countries in Asia. Specifically Indonesia, Malaysia, Sri Lanka, and the Philippines were selected to pilot this initiative. These five countries were selected as we assessed that there was potential to unify and build resilience among the civil society actors on the national level. In addition, we took into consideration the unique NGO dynamics within each respective country and the various different strategies used to draw maximum involvement from other national actors. ADN partnered with long time partner organizations, Suaram in Malaysia, Verite Research in Sri Lanka (a key member of the Asia Democracy Research Network), 24 NGOs in Indonesia, and 11 NGOs in the Philippines.

Prior to ADN's annual regional democracy assembly, ADN organized three sub-regional consultations to brainstorm together with democrats the priorities for democracy renewal in the Asia region. The sub-regional consultation was held respectively in Southeast Asia (SEA), South Asia (SA), and North-East-Central Asia (NEACA) involving approximately 70 national organization partners and over 100 participants. In addition, we held four thematic discussions on the crisis in Afghanistan, Myanmar, Hong Kong, and Dalit issues.

Looking through a Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) lens ADN in collaboration with the Community of Democracies held the **Asia-Africa Democracy Forum (AADF)** from October 26-28, 2022. The forum was a platform to share the findings of the analysis of the democratic situation through the SDG framework, especially the SDG 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions) conducted by experts from Asia and Africa. Prior to the forum, a series of workshops were held with the researchers to discuss the SDG framework. Over a course of a month prior to the forum, the researchers periodically held workshops to collaborate and standardize the reports. Through the workshops, the experts discussed each country's progress in the implementation of the SDG 16. The research findings can be found on ADN's website.

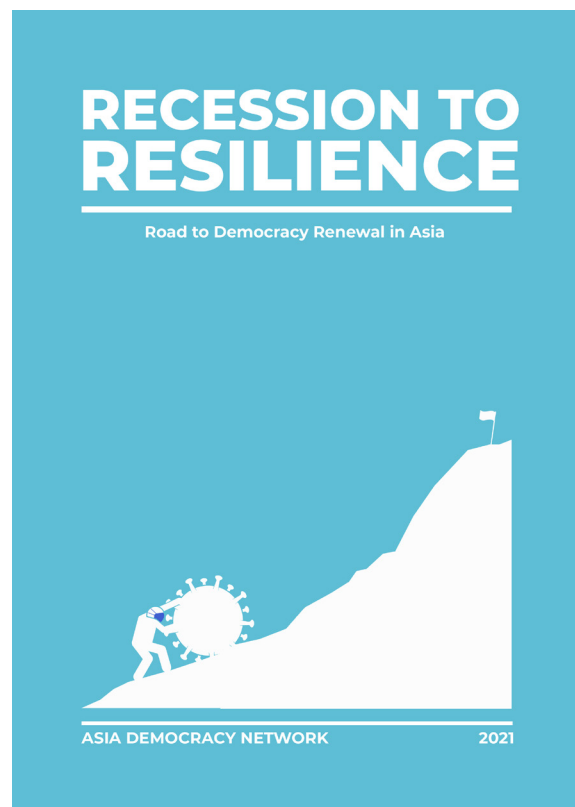
In September 2021, ADN along with 20 Asian regional organizations also co-hosted the **Asia Regional People's Assembly** that focused on the "way forward of addressing the democracy challenges organized with that produced the Asian People Charter of Demand.

Finally, the **Asia Democracy Assembly** is an annual platform where democrats from across multi-sectors gather to exchange knowledge and brainstorm strategies to progress democracy in the region. This year, it was held online from November 23-24, 2022. The two day event was attended by approximately 150 democrats from diverse sectors of civil society. We had the opportunity to report on the findings of the sub-regional consultation recommendation, and further discussed strategy in confronting democracy regression. As a result of the rich experiences and recommendations from the assembly, ADN developed the **Recession to Resilience: Road to Democracy Renewal in Asia** that will serve as a guiding document for the Asia region to confront democracy regression in Asia. The document was launched on Feb 8th, 2022 and also available on ADN's website.

State of Media Freedom in Southeast Asia: Confronting Regression of Media Freedom in SEA The Asia Democracy Network, in partnership with five local organizations in five countries conducted a series of consultations and interviews regarding the state of media in Southeast Asia during the COVID-19 Pandemic. We worked with organizations, such as the Philippine Center for Investigative Journalism (PCIJ) in the Philippines, Asosiasi Media Siber Indonesia (AMSI) in Indonesia, Thai Journalists Association (TJA),

Gerakan Media Merdeka (GeraMM) in Malaysia, and Cambodian Journalists Association (CamboJA). In the Philippines, Malaysia, Indonesia and Thailand, round table consultations were held and representatives from civil society, domestic and foreign media institutions, academe, and government regulatory agencies among others. In Cambodia, on the other hand, due to the political environment, a different approach was taken. In partnership with CamboJA, one-on-one interviews were conducted with ten relevant stakeholders instead of a roundtable discussion.

Through the four consultations and a series of interviews, members of the press were able to send a clear

message regarding the vulnerabilities they face during the pandemic – most of which are pre-existing political problems with their relationship with wielders of power and influence. Through these events, we were able to document the problems faced by the media in the five countries that have commonalities, and that these require a collaborative, regional approach on how to resolve them. There is a clear consensus among stakeholders regarding the sad state where the media is operating now. We were able to receive sets of recommendations, often intersecting in approach despite geographic difference, signifying a desire to move forward in collaboration not only among media, but with other relevant institutions and stakeholders. The consultations have also opened opportunities for these organizations to work together, especially in succeeding advocacy that may result in the

RESPONDING TO DEMOCRACY CRISIS

2021 was a challenging time for democracy in Asia with several democratic crises that took the globe by surprise. In February 2021, Myanmar endured a military coup that resulted in a drastic setback to democracy, in August 2021 after decades long struggle to instill democracy eventually failed when Afghanistan fell to the Taliban. Hong Kong, the rapid deterioration of democracy that started in 2019 continued at an accelerated rate despite the public's outcry for democracy and human rights. In 2021, Hong Kong saw the strengthening grip and pressure of the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) in changing the face of democracy in the territory. Besides taking part in the various scales of global solidarity and advocacy, ADN joined other institutions to provide relief and assistance for civil society actors in facing crises in Afghanistan, Hong Kong, and Myanmar with the focus to ensure their safety, and providing them the ability to continue their response remotely.

In Afghanistan, ADN provided emergency response assistance for vetted civil society actors, who are at high risk of persecution from the Taliban, to self-evacuate. ADN collaborated with the Asian Network for Free and Fair Elections (ANFREL) to identify the at risk activists. The emergency operation took place since the Taliban took control of Kabul and continued until December 2021 and follow up support until May 2022. We succeeded in helping approximately 50 people evacuate to third countries. ADN, together with ANFREL, carried out ongoing coordination and connection with Afghan civil society members and frequently sought advice from FORUM-ASIA, the Urgent Action Fund (UAF), and other human rights defender organizations to ensure a safe and efficient response.

In Myanmar, ADN was able to assist efforts to ensure the safety and protection of its partners as they seek safe spaces. This complements other efforts that other organizations are conducting to protect pro-democracy sectors. The support will continue until the first semester 2021, with additional support consolidation for the Myanmar CSOs operated from the border to create more efficient cooperation among them.

Hong Kong, with the increasing suppression of democratic processes in Hong Kong, the country faces significant challenges to pushback. Many pro-democracy leaders are in persecution or being exiled to seek safety, but eagerly continuing their struggle remotely. Beside enjoin global organizations on campaign and advocate the Hongkong issues, ADN provide various assistance and facilitation that mainly focuses in encouraging solidarity in the region, and to bolster connection of all stakeholders.

MEDIA INTERVENTION & COOPERATION

Physical gatherings and solidarity are still prohibited in the Covid-19 pandemic era. Therefore, many scheduled events that was supposed to take place in some destination were cancel and the world moved towards adapting technologies means as to remain connected, in particular for solidarities and continuing to push back against discrimination, better civic space, for freedom, democracy and human rights.

Like many other organizations, ADN also adapted the usage of technology as a tool to continue our dialogues, engagement, consolidation and solidarity in the era of new normal.

In May 2021, ADN released a report in regards to the state of media freedom in South East Asia which covers Malaysia, Indonesia, Philippines, Cambodia and Thailand. Our consultation covered various stakeholders such as media practitioners, academias, journalists, editors, civil society, government representatives and also intergovernmental representatives. That report came out with 7 key recommendations for stakeholders in the region as to improve the current stake of the media and journalists.
